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1. Open Letter

TO: The Citizens of Cuyahoga County

In 1989, a record number of cases came to the attention of the Cuyahoga County Juvenile Court. A total of 38,643 cases were filed this year representing an 8% increase over 1988. Delinquency cases rose to 9,809, 6% over 1988, and unruly cases decreased 1% from 1988 to 3,289. Unruly and delinquency cases represent a 4% increase over 1988 and 33.9% of the total cases. Notably, the number of drug offense cases totaled 970 and cases involving dependent, neglected, and abused children totaled 2,066. This represents an increase of 197% and 121% respectively over 1988.

The Court continues its goal to provide high quality service. A major accomplishment towards this goal was achieved this year by the bestowing of accreditation on the Probation Department by the American Correctional Association (A.C.A.). In addition, the process for accreditation was completed by the Detention Center. The process required meeting 417 individual standards which cover every facet of juvenile detention operations. To achieve accreditation, a facility must comply with at least 90% of the non-mandatory standards and 100% of the 31 mandatory standards which govern fire safety, health services, food, sanitation, and emergency procedures. Following a four day audit by the A.C.A. visiting committee in September, 1989, the Center achieved an overall compliance score of 97.2%, including a 100% rating for the mandatory standards. The auditors agreed, even though the Cuyahoga County Juvenile Court Detention Center can be described as an old, large, and overcrowded facility, the overall compliance score is "incredible and defies the usual barriers to compliance."

John Manuel, Superintendent of the Detention Center, and Matthias Novak, Accreditation Manager, are praised for their contributions to this achievement.

Accreditation of the Detention Center will add to the Court's prestigious status by being the first juvenile court in Ohio and the only major juvenile court in the country to have earned professional accreditation for probation and detention services.

The excellent compliance rates for both probation and detention services demonstrate the high commitment of the entire Court staff to provide quality service to the community and a sense of pride in their departments and the Court.

In compliance with Ohio Revised Code Section 2151.18, I submit the 1989 Annual Report of the Cuyahoga County Juvenile Court, which shows the number and kinds of cases, the dispositions, and other data pertaining to the work of the Court.

2. Judges



Leodis Harris: A juvenile court judge since 1977, Judge Harris received a B.A. from Cleveland College, Western Reserve University, and his Juris Doctor from Cleveland Marshall Law School.

Prior to his election to the Juvenile Court bench, Judge Harris served in the U.S. Army and upon admission to the Ohio Bar, engaged in the private practice of law for 13 years.

On January 1, 1990, Judge Harris became Administrative Judge of the Cuyahoga County Juvenile Court.



Betty Willis Ruben: Serving her tenth year, Judge Ruben is the only female member of the Cuyahoga County Juvenile Court.

Judge Ruben's dedication to public service carried her to the White House where from 1961 to 1964 she was a member of the staff of Presidents John F. Kennedy and Lyndon B. Johnson. At President Kennedy's direction she developed the first national program to provide treatment and training for five million mentally retarded individuals so that they would have an opportunity to lead normal productive lives.

Concerned about the link between truancy and delinquency, particularly among teenagers, Judge Ruben and her staff established a liaison with the public schools to coordinate efforts to keep youth in school and out of the court system. Presently, assisted by four dedicated

volunteers, her priority is to expedite the placement of dependent, neglected, and abused children in permanent adopting homes.

Judge Ruben received an undergraduate degree at the University of Pittsburgh, an M.B.A. at the Wharton School of the University of Pennsylvania and a law degree at George Washington University.

In an effort to identify causes and successful methods for decreasing juvenile crime, Judge Ruben has visited West Germany, the U.S.S.R., the People's Republic of China and India. In 1988 she delivered a series of lectures on family law to the law students at Fudan University in Shanghai.

Judge Ruben is a member of the Court Statistical Reporting Committee appointed by Chief Justice Thomas Moyer.



Timothy G. Cotner: Completing his second year as a juvenile court judge, Judge Cotner is a graduate of St. Ignatius High School and received a B.A. degree from John Carroll University. His Juris Doctor was received from Cleveland Marshall Law School.

Judge Cotner was elected to the Juvenile Court bench in 1986 and began his term on January 3, 1987. Prior to becoming a juvenile court judge, he was an assistant Ohio Attorney General, assistant Cuyahoga County Prosecutor in criminal and juvenile courts, assistant Director of Law for the City of Cleveland and a Cleveland fire fighter. Judge Cotner also engaged in the private practice of law for 18 years. Judge Cotner is the author of May a Corporation Act as Its Own Attorney which appeared in the 1967 Cleveland - Marshall Law Review.



Robert A. Ferreri, a 1976 graduate of the College of William and Mary in Virginia, took his Law Degree from the Cleveland Marshall College of Law in 1978. The Judge also studied Law at the London School of Economics, London England, through the Notre Dame Law School. Prior to his election in 1989, Judge Ferreri was an attorney in private practice, a Hearing Examiner for the Federal Government and served as Assistant Cuyahoga County Prosecutor under Mr. John T. Corrigan for eight years. He has been admitted to practice before the United States Supreme Court, the Ohio Supreme Court and the United States District Court for the Northern District of Ohio.

Judge Ferreri is a member of the American Bar Association where he serves on the Judicial Administration Committee, the Family Law Committee, the Juvenile Justice Committee and the

Criminal Law Committee. He is also a member of the Association of Trial Lawyers of America, the Ohio Trial Lawyers Association and the Cleveland Bar Association where he served as the Cuyahoga County Prosecutor's Representative of the Victims of Crime Committee, is a present member of the Criminal Law Committee, The Volunteer Lawyers for the Arts Committee and the Juvenile Justice Committee.

The Judge also served as Chairman of the Juvenile Court Committee of the Cuyahoga County Bar Association and is a member of the the Criminal Law Section and the Immigration Law Committee as well as a member of the National District Attorney's Association The Judge continues his involvement with the Drug Awareness Resistance Educational Program (D.A.R.E.) for local school children in conjunction with the Cleveland Police Department and the Cleveland Public Schools. Judge Ferreri is a member of the Board of Trustees of the Justinian Forum of Cleveland and formerly served as Secretary. He is also a Charter Member, former Delegate and present Director on the Board of Directors of the National Italian American Bar Association. With that group, the Judge served as a planner and panelist for "Medicine and Jurisprudence: Where Morality, Ethics and Law Intersect" held in Washington, D.C.

The Judge also serves on the Ohio Department of Youth Services and Subsidy Committee of the Ohio Association of Juvenile and Family Court Judges and is an active member of the National Council of Juvenile and Family Court Judges where he sits on the Metropolitan Courts Committee and with the International Association of Juvenile and Family Court Magistrates. This spring, Judge Ferreri organized, and the Cuyahoga County Juvenile Court presented, a continuing legal education seminar called "The Drug Dependent Mother and Child: Legal, Medical and Social Service Issues" which was attended by over three hundred lawyers, social workers, nurses, probation officers and court workers. The judge is also an affiliate of the Center for Biomedical Ethics of Case Western Reserve University School of Medicine where he is assisting in the development of a medical-legal curriculum for physicians, nurses and other health care professionals and related seminars. In addition, he is working on a long range program with the Center for the Community Dialogue on Values and Health Care relative to the needs of the medically underserved and with substance abuse issues.

Judge Ferreri also has worked with the Cleveland Bar Association's Task Force on Violent Crime strategizing several ways the community can lessen teen violence and discourage teen gang membership and he also participated in the planning of a Substance Abuse and Employment Policy seminar for The Substance Abuse Initiative of Greater Cleveland.

In conjunction with the United Labor Agency, the social service arm of organized labor in the Greater Cleveland Area, Judge Ferreri has planned and implemented an employment program for underprivileged inner city youth which matches youth who have come through his courtroom with Union apprenticeships in the Building Trades.

The Judge is a member of the Police and Fire Holy Name Society, the Citizens League of Greater Cleveland, the National Eagle Scout Association and was the 1984 recipient of the Mayor George V. Voinovich's Certificate of Appreciation for Economic and Community Development from the City of Cleveland. The Judge also participates in Moot Court Competition and speaks frequently on the subject of Juvenile Justice, Delinquency, Teen Gangs and Substance Abuse.




Peter M. Sikora: A graduate of St. Ignatius High School, Judge Sikora earned degrees from Cuyahoga Community College and Baldwin - Wallace College, Summa Cum Laude. He received his Juris Doctor from Case Western Reserve University School of Law.

Judge Sikora was appointed to the juvenile court bench in February, 1989. Previously, he was deputy director and general counsel, Ohio Department of Mental Retardation and Developmental Disabilities; deputy legal counsel to the Governor; and judicial law clerk, Ohio Court of Appeals - Eighth District.

While attending Case Western Reserve University School of Law, Judge Sikora was an associate and an associate editor of the school's Law Review. His article *Charitable Contributions of Public Utilities: Who Should Bear the Cost?* appeared in the winter issue

of the 1980 Case Western Reserve Law Review.





4. Statistics

DRUGS, DEPENDENCY, NEGLECT AND ABUSE SOAR TO HIGHEST RECORD LEVEL

In 1989, a total of 970 drug offense cases were referred to the Court; 910 or 94% were filed officially and 60 were resolved at intake through meditation, warning letters, or informal hearings.

Of the 110 social planning areas in Cuyahoga County, residents from 15 areas were responsible for over 75% of the officially filed drug offenses. An additional 3% of official drug offenses were of residents who live outside the county.



Abuse, neglect, and dependency cases totaled 2,066, an increase of 121% over 1988. Prior to 1987, the total annual number of these cases remained relatively constant with a high in 1984 1000 of 902 cases and a low of 545 in 1986. In 1987, the number rose to 987, a rise of 81% over 1986. A slight decrease of 5% occurred in 1988, reducing the total to 936.

The 1,086 dependency cases filed in 1989 more than doubled the 1988 level. Neglect cases increased to 814, 158% over 1988. Abuse cases nearly doubled from 1988, to 166. Changes in the law may have contributed to the substantial increase in cases in 1989.


