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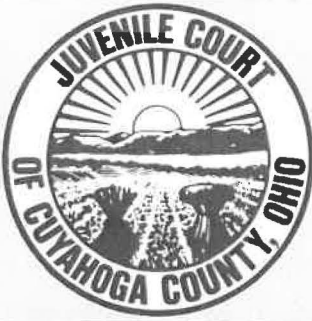


1. Mission

The Mission of Cuyahoga County Juvenile Court reflects its philosophy and mandates; broadly defines its services, the clients served, and the outcomes expected; and establishes standards for moving the Court toward its vision of the future.

The mission of the Cuyahoga County Juvenile Court is:

- *To assess children and families who come to the attention of the Court, process cases expeditiously, and initiate formal court action only when appropriate.*
- *To effect the just determination of every court proceeding by ensuring the parties a fair hearing without undue delay, and recognizing and enforcing their constitutional and other legal rights.*
- *To provide a range of correctional services, designed to reduce recidivism, which balances the best interests of the children and families with the protection of the community.*
- *To follow professionally-accepted standards implemented by educated, well-trained and experienced staff in conjunction with citizen and constituent organizations to ensure effective and efficient delivery of services.*

The mission of the Cuyahoga County Juvenile Court is to provide consistent quality service to children and families. The Court plans and develops new programs to meet the growing delinquency rate in Cuyahoga County. Programs are designed to protect the community from serious offenders and reduce the number of youth committed to state institutions.

In 1990, a record high 39,351 complaints were accepted by the Court. This is an increase of 1.8% over 1989. The number of complaints has been escalating as evidenced by a 39% increase over 1980 (28,284 cases filed) and an increase of 74% over 1970 (22,635 cases filed). Delinquency cases have risen 9% over 1989 and 30% since 1980. Cases of neglected, abused, and dependent children have risen by 1.36% over 1989 and 221% compared to 1980.

Overcrowding and an antiquated physical structure have made the need for a new Detention Center a priority. However, in spite of these conditions, the Cuyahoga County Juvenile Court Detention Center was awarded accreditation from the American Correctional Association (A.C.A.) in January, 1990. Through the efforts of Court staff and, specifically, Detention Center and Probation staff, the Court is the first large urban juvenile court in the country to receive accreditation for both probation and detention services. The Court's Probation Department received accreditation in 1989. Accreditation is awarded for a three year period.


An increase in official unruly complaints was realized in 1990. As of October 29, 1990, most unruly cases are referred to the Pilot Unruly Program (PUP). PUP, an important alternative to filing official and unofficial charges against unruly or status offenders, is a two year pilot program designed to provide immediate intervention. The Court has contracted with Youth Advocate Programs (YAP), a private agency, to operate the program. Youth are referred to the program by the Court before any official action is taken. A youth advocate from YAP contacts the youth and family shortly after receiving the referral. The youth advocate may provide individual, family, and crisis counseling, arrange for clinical services and refer to other social agencies as needed. The Court has also contracted with a researcher who will assist in determining the effectiveness of the

program. PUP will accommodate more than 2000 youth each year. This program allows Court staff to concentrate resources on more serious offenders.

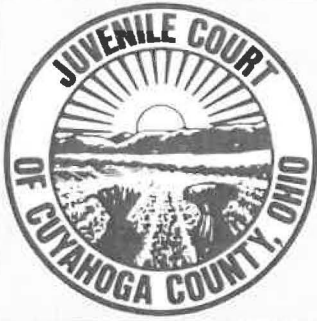
The Court approaches 1991 with many new projects including the development of a boot camp and a community corrections program. This year's report features the Court's seven departments.

In compliance with Ohio Revised Code Section 2151.18, I submit the 1990 Annual Report of the Cuyahoga County Juvenile Court, which shows the number and kinds of cases, the dispositions, and other data pertaining to the work of the Court.

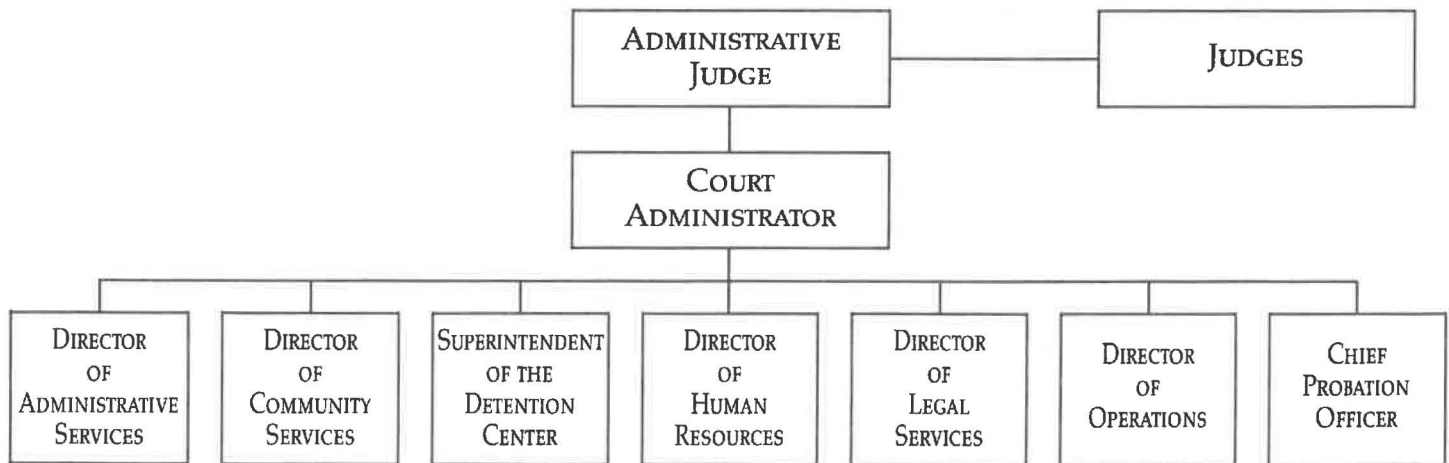


3. Departments

COURT ADMINISTRATION

The Cuyahoga County Juvenile Court opened its doors on June 4, 1902. Originally, the Court was established to manage delinquent children. Its nearly 90 year history has seen the scope of its services to children of 60 communities throughout Cuyahoga County continuously expand. As a result, administering the Court has become more complex.

The entire Court is the responsibility of the Administrative Judge, **Leodis Harris**. The Administrative Judge is elected annually by the six Juvenile Court Judges. The Court Administrator is selected by the Administrative Judge. As Court Administrator, **William A. Kurtz** is responsible for the administration and coordination of seven departments and an annual budget of over \$28,000,000.



ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES

The Administrative Services Department is responsible for the Court's budget, revenue collection, and the management information system. The Department is directed by **Dennis Dinardo** with a budget of over \$1.7 million and a staff of 28.

The Court's fiscal review officer, empowered by Court order, reviews financial resources of parents with children in private placement facilities. In 1990, \$131,042 was collected from these parents and was deposited into the Cuyahoga County General Fund. Placement of youth in private residential facilities costs the County an average of \$84.05 per day per youth.

Statistical analysis is important in evaluating Court operations and

planning for future needs. In 1990, the Administrative Services Department collected and analyzed data on in-home treatment, placement and aftercare, and individual offenders.

COMMUNITY SERVICES DEPARTMENT

The Community Services Department provides a range of correctional and social services including assessment, restitution, mediation, counseling, and residential placement. In addition, the Department is responsible for community relations which informs the public of Juvenile Court operations, policies and services, and volunteer services offering concerned citizens an opportunity to participate in the Juvenile Court process. The Department, directed by **Elsie Day**, has a budget of over \$8 million. Services are provided by a staff of 34 through approximately 85 contracts with individuals and agencies.

The Pilot Unruly Program (PUP), instituted by the Department in 1990, is a two year pilot program providing families and complainants with an effective alternative to filing official and unofficial complaints against unruly or status offenders. The project will serve at least 2,000 unruly children and their families during each year of operation. An advisory committee of community volunteers oversees the operation of the program and will make recommendations to the Court regarding the merits of continuation.

The Department is also planning a community corrections program and boot camp designed to reduce the number of youth committed to the Ohio Department of Youth Services and the Youth Development Center.

DETENTION CENTER

The Detention Center provides temporary supervision of youth pending court hearings or awaiting final disposition of Court cases. The Center provides for the care, protection, and well-being of detained youth while ensuring safety for the public. The Center is operated 24 hours a day and provides educational, recreational, medical, and social services to detainees. Home Detention, a program within the Detention Center, is designed as an alternative to secure detention, which allows youth to remain in their homes pending court appearances under the daily supervision of a home detention worker. The Detention Center is directed by Superintendent **John Manuel** who is responsible for a budget of over \$6.2 million and a staff of 157. The Detention Center served 3,924 youth in 1990, and 1,096 were served by Home Detention.

This year also marks the accreditation of the Detention Center by the American Correctional Association. The facility received an overall score of 97.2%, reflecting 100% compliance with 31 national mandatory standards and over 94% compliance with 386 national non-mandatory standards. Through the accreditation effort, the Center adopted a comprehensive policy and procedure manual, implemented extensive staff training programs, quality fire and safety programs, and extensive physical plant improvements.

HUMAN RESOURCES DEPARTMENT

The Department of Human Resources is responsible for maintaining a quality work force. This is accomplished by identifying staffing patterns and requirements, and facilitating the selection, training, promotion, and termination procedures while complying with federal and state regulations. The Department also establishes and reviews personnel, wage and salary, and staff development policies and practices. **James Prunty** directs the Department with a staff of 11 and a budget of approximately \$415,000.

A consulting firm is working with the Department to determine the internal equity and competitiveness of current job positions and to determine the reliability and validity of the Court's job evaluation process. Job evaluation provides management with a sound basis for using payroll dollars effectively while providing employees with a clear definition of the abilities and skills required for various positions.

Training opportunities are provided to the Court's 476 employees. Staff receive training in various subject areas allowing them to remain current in their professions. Additionally, staff receive continuing education units (CEU) required by the American Correctional Association that may be used to maintain professional licenses.

LEGAL DEPARTMENT

The Department of Legal Services processes all cases coming under the jurisdiction of the Juvenile Court, implements changes in juvenile law, and monitors the Court's compliance with legal mandates. Directed by **Richard Graham**, the Department has a budget of over \$3.8 million and a staff of 94. The Department of Legal Services is comprised of a multitude of services including referees, clerk's office, assignment, custody review, and intake.

Intake mediators usually have the first Court contact with clients and victims. They decide whether to accept legal jurisdiction and process the case officially or to resolve the case at intake according to legal principles and Court guidelines. If an official filing is made, the case is assigned a Court case number and a date for a Court appearance. If the case can be resolved at intake (RAI), the intake mediator has several options including a warning letter to parents, a referral to a community based program, or mediation. The mediation option requires the participation of the accused youth, the youth's family, and the victim or complainant. Through a structured and phased process, all parties are given an opportunity to explain their situation. The intake mediator then develops a contract which all parties agree to and sign. If any party does not abide by the terms of the contract, the case may face further mediation or an official filing. If the contract is adhered to within the stipulated time limitations, the case is considered closed and no further Court action is taken. In 1990, 11,794 official cases were filed and 6,618 cases were resolved at intake.

OPERATIONS DEPARTMENT

The Operations Department is responsible for building and space maintenance, security, transportation, and maintaining social history records. Directed by **Thomas Foster**, the Department operates with a budget of over \$3.3 million and a staff of 52.

In late 1990, the Teamsters' Building, 2191 East 19th Street, was purchased by the Cuyahoga County Commissioners. Renovation is planned to accommodate Juvenile Court staff. The majority of space will be used for Court staff relocated from the Loews Building, 1515 Euclid Avenue. The remaining space will be used to provide additional accommodations for main Court staff, making more space available at the main Juvenile Court building.

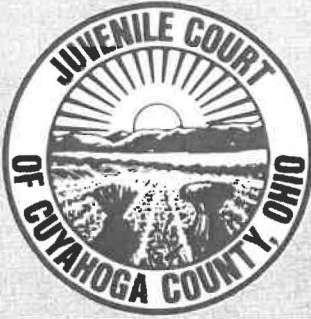
Two additional branch offices also opened in 1990. Both sites demanded complete renovation prior to their use. Each office has individual office space for 18 probation and intake staff members, a conference room and a lobby. The East Cleveland office is located at 15815 Euclid Avenue and the Southeast office is located at 5311 Northfield Road, Bedford Hts. With these latest additions, the Department is responsible for eight buildings utilized by the Court throughout Cuyahoga County.

PROBATION DEPARTMENT

The Probation Department is responsible for preparing case investigations and pre-dispositional reports for Court hearings and supervising and counseling youth under Court-ordered probation. Chief Probation Officer **Andrew J. DeSanti** directs a department of 112 staff and a budget of over \$3.4 million. In 1990, 2,721 children were placed on probation by Court order.

A system of case classification is used by the Department to efficiently distribute Court resources and address needs of juvenile offenders on probation. The system provides four levels of supervision for probationers based on probability of recidivism (a return to Court on new charges). Levels of supervision vary from intensive supervision, where a youth is contacted twice a day, seven days a week for up to 14 months, to low risk supervision with periodic contacts by staff and volunteers for a maximum of three months.

The Cuyahoga County Juvenile Court Probation Department was awarded accreditation by the American Correctional Association in 1989 and the process for renewing accreditation is continuing.



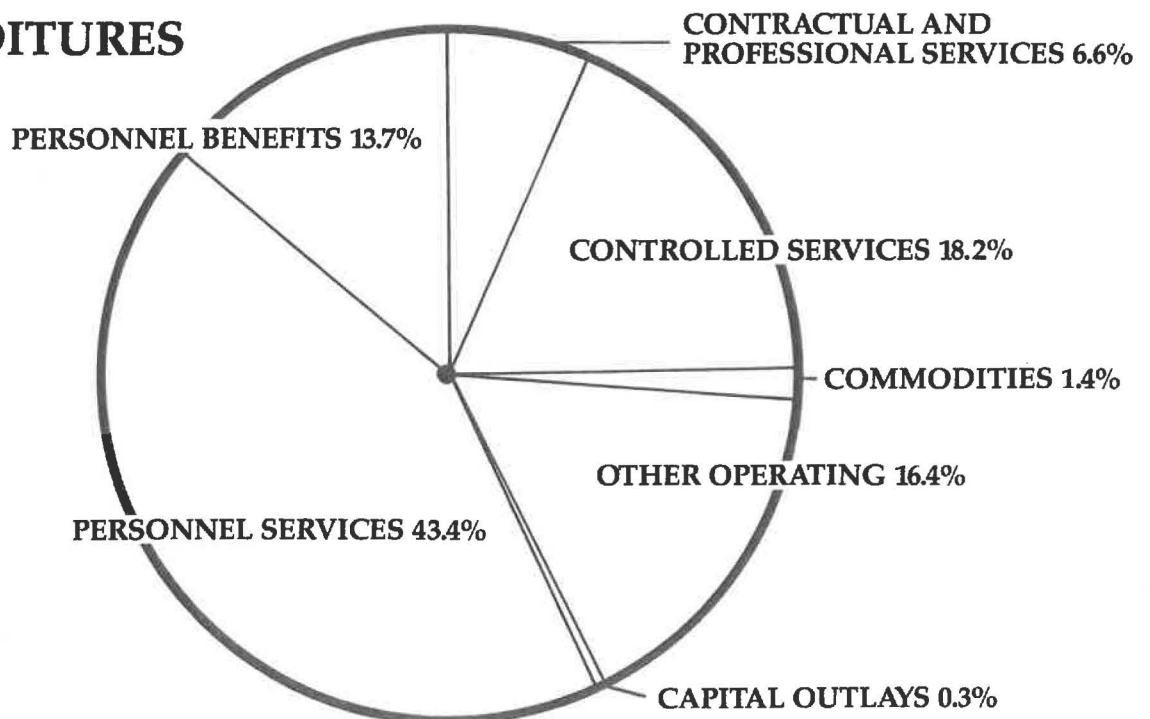

1990 EXPENDITURES



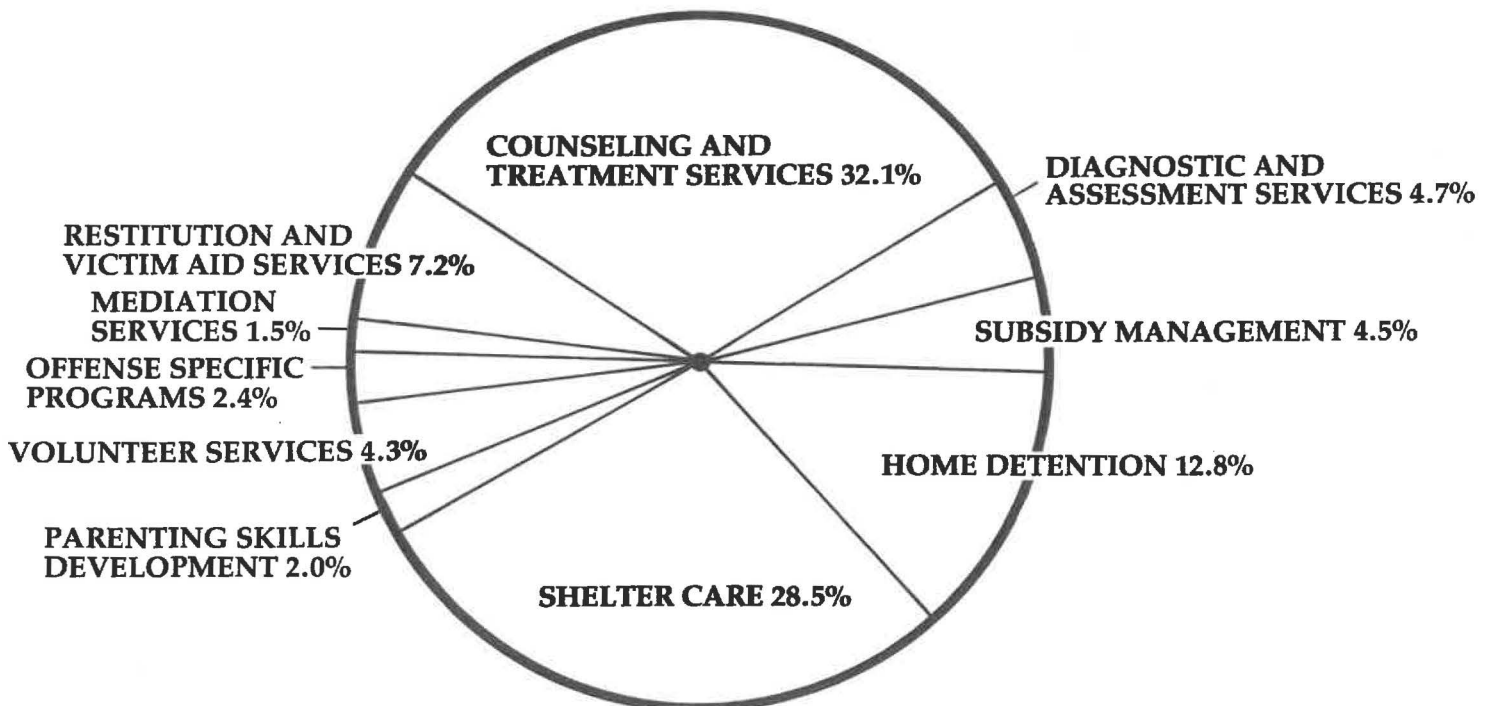

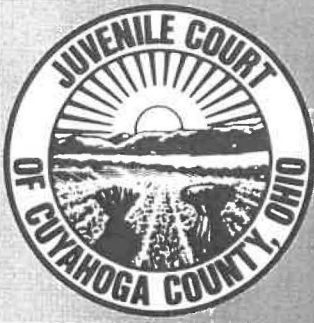

DETENTION CENTER OVERCROWDING: *A Historical Perspective*

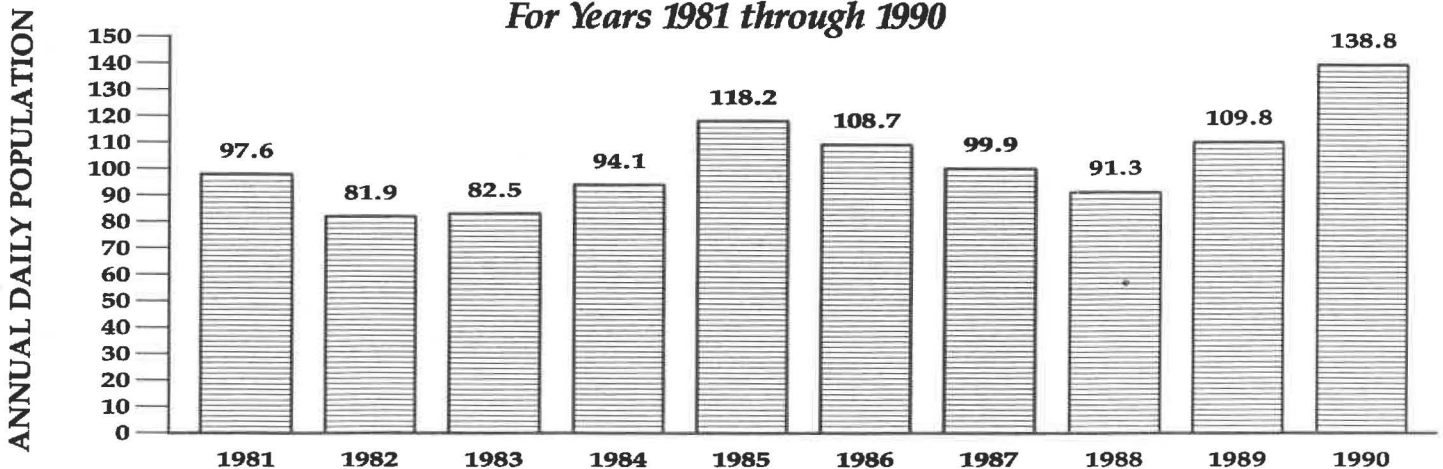
The Cuyahoga County Juvenile Court Detention Center has a rated capacity of 86 children. During the past decade, 1981-1990, the rated capacity has been exceeded in 90 of the 120 months.

For the last nine months of 1989, the rated capacity was exceeded by 37%, with an average of 32 children over capacity each day, resulting in an average daily population of 118 children. In 1990 the over-capacity rate increased to 62%, with an average of 53 children over capacity each day and an average daily population of 139 children. Such overcrowding is caused by a number of factors, including case volume, population control processes, usage policy, case processing, and the availability of dispositional resources.

In 1932, when the current Detention Center was constructed, the total capacity for care was 160; with 100 beds assigned to delinquents, and 60 beds for dependent children. In the mid-1950's, the responsibility for housing dependent children was removed from the Court. However, most of the space occupied by those services was converted into office space, reducing the overall capacity to 108 beds. The population during the mid-1950's then averaged 120 children per day or 11% over capacity.

By the early 1960's, the Detention Center population rose to an average of 170 per day, or 57% over capacity. The extreme overcrowding of that period led to the construction of what was intended to be a facility "annex," but which has since become the present day

Detention Center. In 1985, the capacity of the facility was further reduced to 93 when an unused girls' sleeping area was utilized by the expanding Detention Center school. A desire to conform to the American Correctional Association standards again reduced the rated capacity of the facility to the current 86 in 1989.

The increase in overcrowding during the past two years may be partially attributed to an increasing volume of chronic offenders. In 1989, a study concerning probation recidivism showed that while chronic offenders represented only 25% of all juvenile offenders, they accounted for 47% of all the cases filed that year.

Case planning and optimum dispositional services become more involved and more time consuming for chronic offenders. This produces an extended case hearing process resulting in a decreased number of children leaving the Center and a daily population over the stated capacity. This pattern, accompanied by even modest increases in admissions to the Detention Center, suggests that detention overcrowding will not be alleviated.

It appears that the existing capacity of 86 will not accommodate the current needs. The Court's visionary planning of the 1930's provided for a 100 bed facility which served well for a quarter of a century. During that time, the Court's official delinquency rate was approximately 2,000 cases per year, allowing for a detention rate of 50 youth per 1,000 cases. The Court's current official delinquency rate of approximately 7,000 cases per year equates to a detention rate of approximately 12 youths per 1,000 cases based on an 86 bed capacity.

Despite efforts to implement more community alternatives and to reduce detention overcrowding, current figures illustrate the need for more space and more beds as a result of increased recidivism and complex case processing. Community programming is a necessary strategy; however, it is not appropriate for all youth. Detention is necessary for certain youth and the need is mounting.

Detention Center Capacity = 86 Youth

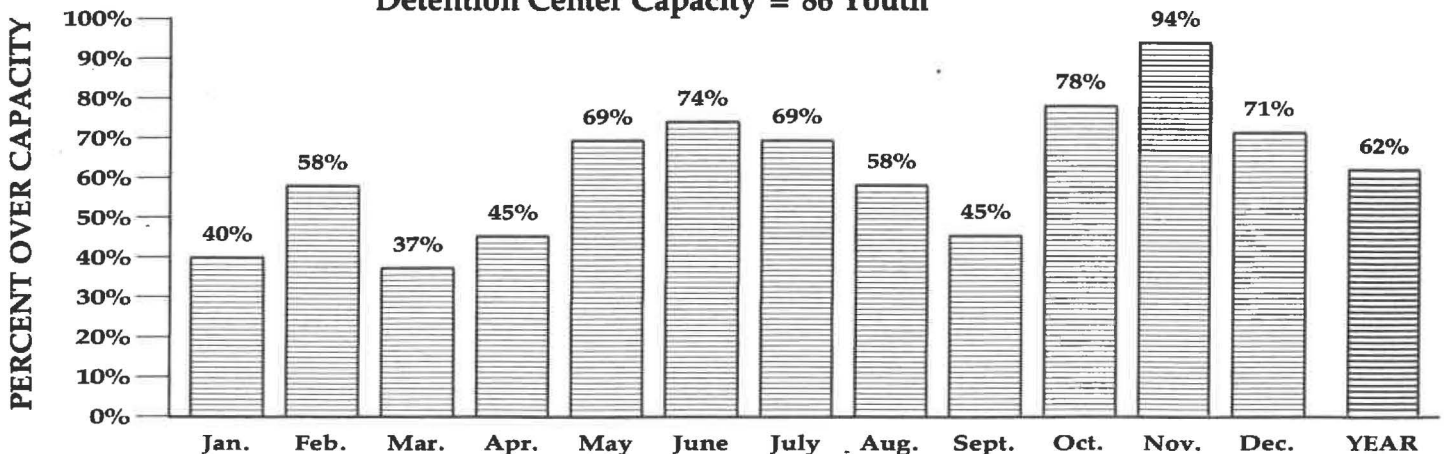

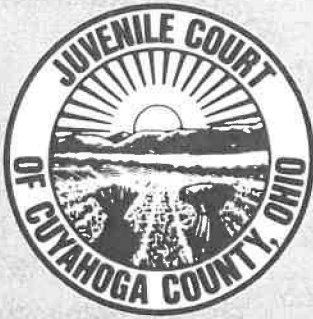

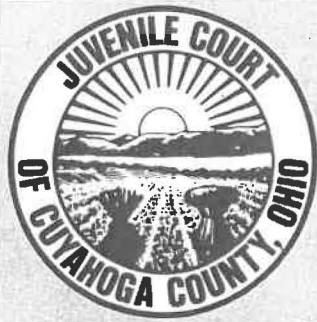
