

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### 1. Mission Statement

The Mission of Cuyahoga County Court of Common Pleas – Juvenile Division reflects its philosophy and mandates, broadly defines its services, the clients served and the outcomes expected and established standards for moving the Court towards its vision of the future.

### THE MISSION OF THE CUYAHOGA COUNTY COURT OF COMMON PLEAS – JUVENILE DIVISION IS:

To administer justice, rehabilitate juveniles, support and strengthen families, and promote public safety.



## 2. Open Letter

TO: The Citizens of Cuyahoga County

The Honorable Jane Campbell, Timothy Hagan, and Timothy McCormack Commissioners of Cuyahoga County

The Honorable Geno Natalucci-Persichetti Director, Ohio Department of Youth Services

Our Juvenile Court was founded in 1902 as an experiment – part social service agency and part judicial tribunal. In the succeeding years the Court has grown from one Judge and a handful of employees to six Judges and more than 600 employees. But the growth has been accompanied by little thought and less direction. As a result, several of our systems are archaic, inefficient and most of all, ineffective.

The number of cases accepted by the Court continues to increase. In just the last five years, Delinquency and Unruly cases increased by thirty-two percent (32%), Neglect cases accepted by the Court increased by a dramatic sixty-six percent (66%), Abuse cases grew over twenty-four percent (24%) and Applications for Custody of children jumped two hundred and thirty-eight percent (238%), while Adult Support/Custody cases rose almost two hundred eighty percent (280%). However, the allocated resources did not keep pace.

The Court's original mission was to rehabilitate offenders, in a system tailored made to meet their youthful needs, before they became adult criminals. However, an ever-increasing wave of juvenile violence has led to erosion of public confidence in the ability of the court to carry out this mission. An indication of this attitude is the lowering of the age limit by the Ohio legislature in 1996 for juvenile transfer to the adult criminal court from fifteen to fourteen years of age. By 1997 the Cuyahoga County Juvenile Court itself was placed on trial. Bedford police Detective Chris Valley, in a letter to the Plain Dealer, expressed the community frustration with Court policy when he questioned the wisdom of diverting misdemeanor cases by sending warning letters to parents of the accused. In 1997, 3,260 warning letters were mailed to parents.

It was apparent that many of the juveniles continued to commit delinquent acts after their initial involvement with the Court. Yet no recidivism rates were calculated nor were any studies undertaken to ascertain what rehabilitative programs were successful or how many adjudicated youth graduated to the criminal courts. With no solid research base to determine the selection of programs, costly programs were given only a perfunctory evaluation.

Funding for costly programs, such as the Boot Camp, was renewed despite mounting national evidence of their ineffectiveness.

The management of cases fared no better. The road, which complaints travel from filing to disposition, is needlessly crooked and can accumulate an excessive number of stops thereby providing opportunities for misplacement or loss of files. The length of time required to process and dispose of the average case is compounded. Due process is denied and justice is delayed at great expense to the parties and the public.

Stung by a series of incidents of physical abuse of youth held in an overcrowded Detention Center, the inability of the Court system to admit, arraign, and release youth according to statutory guidelines, and by the frequency of escapes, the Court commissioned an evaluation of the facility. The study found it to be "one of the most adult-oriented, bleak, depressing, unsafe, and psychologically harmful facilities." Public suggestions were made that, since the Judges were not experts in managing a detention facility, it ought to be transferred to the jurisdiction of the County Sheriff. As a result, the County Commissioners appointed Thomas J. Hayes to provide immediate crisis relief. Mr. Hayes discharged this responsibility with dispatch and distinction.

Statutes regulating the removal of children, believed to be abused or neglected, from parents were violated. Children were taken from homes without legal authority and the parents were at the mercy of those practices.

Our response to all the documented deficiencies and the criticism they provoked must neither be timid nor short-sighted. What is past cannot be allowed to become prologue. Bold, decisive, but thoughtful, remedial action is demanded.

We must consolidate the present fragmented, duplicative and cumbersome clerical operations, and centralize the 60 employees who process files into one Clerk's Office capable of efficiently accepting and processing case documentation in a timely fashion. We must evaluate the success rate of programs to which our juveniles are referred at an annual cost to taxpayers of approximately 6 million dollars. We must discontinue the discredited practice of mailing warning letters to parents of the perpetrators of minor crimes and instead encourage communities to develop and enforce appropriate sanctions. We must develop a formula, based on criteria used by the Ohio Department of Youth Services, to redistribute some of the Ohio Reclaim funds to local entities for this purpose. The Court must establish a rapport with the community by locating Probation Officers in neighborhood centers. There they can interact with parents and introduce them to already existing family programs. To maximize the benefit to our youth, Probation Officers must develop a relationship with the police officers in the geographical area to which they are assigned. And, finally, we will need to begin the process of constructing a modern, thoughtfully designed Detention Center, which can provide the population with individual short-term care and treatment.

I want to thank my colleagues for the opportunity to refocus the direction of the Court. But no reform efforts can be successful without the participation and support of the employees in the organization. My greatest reward has been the enthusiasm and dedication with which our employees have responded to the challenges I have placed before them. A majority of them have served the children and families of this community for many years. When asked to make the system work better, they have performed unselfishly and with joie de vivre. I am grateful to all of them.

In compliance with Ohio Revised Code Section 2151.18, I submit the 1997 Annual Report of the Cuyahoga County Court of Common Pleas, Juvenile Division which displays the number and kinds of cases before it, their dispositions, and other data pertaining to the work of the Court.

# 3. Update of Events

### **ADMINISTRATIVE JUDGE**

On December 5, 1997 Judge Betty Willis Ruben was unanimously elected the Administrative Judge for 1998. She has served as Juvenile Court Judge for 17 years and this is her first time as Administrative Judge. It is also her last year as Judge.

### **NEW JUDGE**

In January 1997, Judge William F. Chinnock was appointed Juvenile Court Judge by Governor George W. Voinovich. Judge Chinnock filled the seat of Judge Kenneth Rocco who was elected to the Court of Appeals.

### **DELINQUENCY PREVENTION PLAN**

In 1997, the County Commissioners, Juvenile Court Judges, other County agencies, and community stake-holders convened to develop the Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention System Comprehensive Strategy. This group will generate a plan of action for preventing delinquency and improving the lives of children in Cuyahoga County.

### **COURT ADMINISTRATOR**

On January 5, 1998, John K. Zachariah was named the Juvenile Court Administrator. Mr. Zachariah was previously the Chief Probation Officer, Director of Administrative Services, and Deputy Court Administrator for Juvenile Court.

#### DEPUTY COURT ADMINISTRATOR

On January 5, 1998, Michel Telep was appointed the Deputy Court Administrator to oversee the Court Services functions of the Court. Mr. Telep previously served as Judge Ruben's Bailiff.

#### "COMMUNITY COURT"

On January 5, 1998, the Court promised to end the practice of sending warning letters as a substitute for Court action. In place of the warning letters, the Court has initiated a Community Diversion Program featuring Volunteer Magistrates to hear complaints and mete punishment in the communities where the offense occurs.

### **DETENTION CENTER**

1997 was a year of many difficulties for the Detention Center. An evaluation of the facility showed it as "one of the most adult-oriented, bleak, depressing, unsafe, and psychologically harmful facilities." As a result, the County Commissioners assigned Mr. Tom Hayes to provide immediate crisis relief. Physical improvements were made to improve the dilapidated and overcrowded facility. By the end of the year, the average daily population had shrunk to its lowest point since 1993.

#### **COURT NETWORK**

In 1997, the Court began the process for developing a new legal case management and detention tracking system in conjunction with the building of a network environment at the Court and the satellite offices. By summer of 1998, a network will be in place and Court staff will slowly be migrated onto it.

#### **GRIFFITH STUDY**

In a concern for the salary scale at Juvenile Court, the County Commissioners agreed to hire David M. Griffith & Associates to evaluate every position at Juvenile Court and compare it to existing positions in the County. As a result, the Court adopted a new salary scale consistent with the rest of the County.

#### **LEGISLATION**

House Bill 1 signed in 1997 amended Ohio's system for the release of youth in the Ohio Department of Youth Services prior to their original release date. HB1 created a release authority to release youth before their original sentence had been served. HB1 also required each court to complete a comprehensive Dispositional Investigative Report to be completed on every youth sent to DYS.

Senate Bill 35 signed in 1997 revised Ohio's driver's license laws to allow youth at 15 and a half to obtain a temporary instruction permit. In some cases, a driving curfew is in effect.

House Bill 342 signed and went into effect in 1997 required mandatory fingerprinting and DNA evidence to be collected for the purposes of creating a statewide identification database.



### 5. Statistics

1997 showed an 8% increase from 1996 in total complaints at Juvenile Court. Although official delinquency and unruly complaints decreased 14%, resolved at intake delinquency and unruly complaints increased 19%. The total number of delinquency and unruly complaints has increased by 32% in the last five years. Delinquency and unruly complaints made up 38% of the Court's new filings; dependency, neglect, and abuse complaints made up 9%; traffic complaints made up 35%.

Complaints of violent offenses increased 8% from 1996 to 1997, while property complaints dropped 3% and drugs dropped 14%.

In 1997, 58% of the delinquency and unruly complaints were filed on blacks compared to 55% in 1996 – an increase of 3%. In 1997, 38% of the delinquency and unruly complaints were filed on whites compared to 36% in 1996 – an increase of 2%. The percentage of Hispanic youth decreased from 9% in 1996 to 4% in 1997.

In 1997, there was a dramatic shift in the demographics of the offenders. Cleveland City accounted for a 6% decrease in delinquency and unruly complaints filed at Juvenile Court as compared to 1996. Cuyahoga County suburbs showed a 12% increase in delinquency and unruly complaints. This pattern is also evidenced by the source of complaint. Suburban Police Department referrals to Juvenile Court increased 20% from 1996 and Cleveland Police Department referrals decreased 16%. Still, Cleveland City accounts for 56% and Cuyahoga suburbs account for 42% of delinquency and unruly complaints.

There were also dramatic changes in the population at the Juvenile Detention Center. Although there were essentially the same number of youth admitted to the Detention Center from 1996 to 1997, the average daily population dropped from 158.6 in 1996 to 140.8 in 1997 (the lowest since 1993). The average length of stay also dropped significantly from 18.0 in 1996 to 15.9 in 1997. These differences were affected by a change in the detention admission and population management strategies.
