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Mission Statement

To administer justice, rehabilitate juveniles, support and strengthen families, and promote public safety.

In 1999 the first Juvenile Court in the nation, the Chicago Juvenile Court, celebrated its One-Hundredth Anniversary. In 2002, the Cuyahoga County Juvenile Court will also observe one hundred years of service. The concept of a special court for children was slow to develop but came to be accepted as an effort to divert them from a deleterious association with adults in the criminal justice system and to turn them from a life of crime. National reaction to today's juvenile violence, however, seems to revisit some of the crude practices and conditions which moved the founding fathers to the social action that resulted in the establishment of the Court.

For example, among those practices and conditions was the housing of children in jail cells with all types of adult offenders and their indiscriminate appearance on the adult docket in the various police courts of the city. Today's response in dealing with delinquency, especially in terms of the violent offender, is seen in the legislative ease with which juveniles may be transferred to the adult system. Prosecution as adults, for example, is mandated under certain conditions. The age at which transfers to the adult system may occur has been lowered, and the continuation of juvenile incarceration in an adult facility, or "blended sentencing," among other approaches to the problem, have been proposed.

These kinds of legislative reactions to curb juvenile violence are spurred by the most sensational acts of violence that have erupted across the nation. While such legislation has eroded judicial discretion in implementing individual treatment plans, the Court remains, nonetheless committed to fulfilling its mandated mission to provide rehabilitative services to the best of its ability, and to aid those who come to it in search of redress. To this end you will note in the following Annual Report, that while our delinquency cases declined by 17 percent, our transfers to the Criminal Division declined by twice that rate, or by 34.5 percent over those of last year. Interestingly, within that drop, those that were mandatory transfers fell by 37 percent, while discretionary ones declined by 28 percent. At the same time, in view of the 17 percent case decline, the use of rehabilitative probation services increased by nearly two percent.

The year 1999, therefore, continued to be one of implementing the Court's rehabilitative services through its Probation Department, through referrals to community counseling agencies and by use of the State's Felony Delinquency Case and Custody Fund. The Court also expanded its community diversion program to include 27 participating suburbs during the year. This program, started in 1998, allows local communities to deal with first-time misdemeanants and unruly juveniles thereby permitting the Court to devote its efforts to more serious offenders. The Court is pleased to announce that the City of Cleveland entered the diversion program towards the end of the year.

Probation services were improved by extending operational hours at branch offices to include early evening hours. As a result, contacts with youths and families were significantly increased by the availability of staff after regular working hours. For youth that were not amenable to probation or other in-community services, commitments were made to the Ohio Department of Youth Services and the County Youth Development Center.

With the cooperation of the County Commissioners, the County Children and Family Services, and the assistance of the Ohio Supreme Court, we were able to deal with the large volume of custody cases referred during the year. These cases were in need of more expeditious hearings in accordance with newly enacted legislation. The Court also continued its cooperation with the County Commissioners to develop a sound approach to dealing with the delinquency problem. To this end it co-sponsors with the commissioners a program, composed of public and private agencies, called a **Comprehensive Strategy for Delinquency Prevention and Juvenile Justice.** Among the major aims of the program is the coordination and improvement of the methods used by those agencies in their efforts to treat and to prevent delinquency.


The Court is grateful to have received a Federal grant of \$400,000 to expand the work of the Drug Court, which specializes in the rehabilitation of drug offenders. In the last of several recommendations to upgrade court service, the position of Juvenile Rights Advocate was added to the Detention Center staff to ensure the protection of the rights of those held in the secure facility. Admissions to the Center during the year increased by twenty- percent, but through the careful management of population, a decrease of 9 percent was achieved in the average length of stay.

Work continued throughout the year on the Court's new in-house information system, JIMS, which will make the management of Court cases more efficient, contribute to the ease of processing cases, retrieval of information, warrant processing, and the generation of management reports. It will also provide for program evaluation along with research into case characteristics. It is anticipated that the system will be operational by third quarter 2000.

Along with these accomplishments, I hereby submit, in compliance with Ohio Revised Code Section 2151.18, the 1999 Annual Report of the Cuyahoga County Juvenile Court concerning the number and kinds of cases before it, their dispositions, and other data pertaining to the work of the Court.



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DETENTION CENTER

In 1999 there were 5,108 admissions to the Detention Center. This was an increase of 21% from 1998, and the highest number of admissions in the history of the Detention Center. The average daily population increased by 14.5 juveniles from 1998 to 141.2 in 1999. The average length of stay, however, decreased by slightly more than one day despite the increased admissions.

The Detention Center completed nine modules of the "Fundamental Training Curriculum for Careworkers in Juvenile Detention" developed by the National Juvenile Detention Association. Staff from the Detention Center participated in over 4,500 hours of training.

PROGRAMS

Through continued efforts with various community-based organizations, the Court implemented new programs to better serve juveniles. A variety of outreach services, as well as community service projects, are now available to youth. The Mt. Sinai Day Treatment program and Project Restoration, as well as various clean-up projects are among the initiatives that have resulted.

The Community Diversion Program expanded by 20 communities and diverted five times as many cases from the previous year, for a total of 930.

The Summer Youth Employment Training Program provided over 120 jobs in 1999 to youth whose families met income guidelines.

The Drug Court enrolled 22 juveniles into the program.

CLERK OF COURTS

In 1999, the Clerk's office fully processed a huge volume of backlogged motions and court orders. The office was restructured into eight teams and the entire staff was trained to handle a case from beginning to end. The clerks now have the capacity to do everything within their unit, instead of specializing in only one area of the process. This new system has enabled the Clerk's office to prepare for court dates months in advance.

COMPLAINTS AND DISPOSITIONS

Total Court cases decreased by almost 11% from 1998. Total delinquency cases filed declined 17% as well as the unruly cases which fell 16.2% from the previous year. While the total number of Cuyahoga County Department of Children and Family Services cases decreased slightly (2.8%), the dependency cases increased by almost 25%, from 438 to 543 cases.

All categories of offenses experienced decreases in the numbers of cases filed. Drug offenses experienced the most substantial decrease with a drop of 27.5% from 1998. The next largest decrease was property offenses (18.7%), followed by public order offenses (14.9%), and finally violent offenses (9.3%).

As noted in the open letter, the number of juveniles placed on probation increased by 2% from 1998 for a total of 2,834 assignments, despite the decrease in delinquency and unruly cases filed. There were 400 new commitments to the Ohio Department of Youth Services and 232 commitments to the County Youth Development Center in 1999. Seventy-four juveniles were bound over to adult court in 1999.

ADMINISTRATION

Judge Peter M. Sikora was elected Administrative Judge at the end of 1999.
