On the eve of the Cuyahoga County Juvenile Court's Centennial Year, I am pleased to report that our Court has maintained and strengthened its vital and unique calling to administer justice, rehabilitate juveniles, support families and promote public safety. While this Court can boast of its historic efforts to preserve strong families and order rehabilitative services to youth in the overall context of the justice system and in keeping with public safety, the Cuyahoga County Juvenile Court recognizes that it must meet many new challenges to effectively serve our communities today.

Throughout this nation, problems in the current system of juvenile justice continue to challenge us. Our Court, as many others, faces moderate to severe crowding in its inadequate detention facility. Service gaps still exist for youth with significant emotional and psychological needs and, for various reasons, recidivism rates often remain high. Case-processing delays cause overuse of costly detention facilities and minority overrepresentation remains a significant issue for the entire juvenile justice system.

The Cuyahoga County Juvenile Court has recognized many of these issues as challenges to our very mission in 2000. We have met the challenges in a multitude of ways. Although much work remains to be done, I am proud to report that the Cuyahoga County Juvenile Court undertook several major initiatives to deliver legal and social services to children fairly, efficiently and effectively.

One of the most noteworthy endeavors of the past year was the implementation of the Juvenile Information Management System (JIMS) on July 24, 2000. This complete transformation of our data processing capabilities will take a minimum of one year to fully develop. Yet even now this state-of-the-art system offers unlimited research potential, heretofore unattainable by our former technology. Our staff provided tremendous energy to train employees, modify policies and procedures and address design problems. Through the dedication of our fine staff, in conjunction with the technological assistance rendered by the Ohio Supreme Court, our statistical data will soon be the most accurate possible.

In furtherance of improved case management, the Court streamlined the emergency custody process resulting in a 55% reduction in the re-filing of abuse, neglect and dependency cases. During the year, the Court increased its capacity to hear and dispose of permanent custody cases by operationalizing two full time dockets at the Metzenbaum Center. At the same time, the Court dedicated three magistrates and additional support staff to enhance the timely resolution of increasing numbers of paternity and child support establishment cases.

Mindful of the need to use our secure detention resources wisely, the Court commenced use of a Detention Screening Instrument for admittees processed by our Detention Center. Our intake staff responded to the mission to increase our use of informal hearings and mediations by reducing the number of formal unruly complaints by nearly 11% from 1999. Through the devoted work of our drug court unit, the drug court expanded its services and participant levels over 1999. Lastly, our Community Diversion Program expanded to 47 communities throughout the county, serving over 1,500 youth in the year 2000.

Reviewing our services to youth through our Probation Department received major emphasis in 2000. Two regional probation supervision units were added to the existing five. These additions have increased our ability to build coalitions with community resources and better identify service needs. The Mentally III Juvenile Offenders Project, which is a pilot program, was implemented to work with felony offenders at the local level, rather than resort to a commitment to the Ohio Department of Youth Services. This project is funded through the State Board of Mental Health and ODYS.

After years of negotiations, the Court signed a labor union contract with SEIU Local 47 for many of the employees of the detention center. In addition, the Court and the Board of County Commissioners agreed to purchase land for the construction of a new Youth Intervention Center. This facility, which will replace the old and outdated Detention Center, will include a comprehensive assessment center to provide critically needed assessments of youth in a most timely and efficient manner. Such data will allow our jurists appropriate and detailed insight into the multiple issues facing the clients appearing before them.

Along with these accomplishments, the Juvenile Court requested a full performance audit to be conducted of its operations by Auditor of State James Petro. Every effort was made to provide the audit team with records, data and other information so a complete review of court operations could be made. The Court is committed to implementing recommendations forthcoming from this study.

Finally, the Juvenile Court has been engaged in a countywide Comprehensive Strategy for Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention. This expansive undertaking, developed by the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention and sponsored by the Juvenile Court Judges and the Board of County Commissioners, resulted in 32 recommendations designed to effect coordination amongst county agencies in the delivery of services to youth and families. The Juvenile Court will continue to play a major part in the development of many comprehensive strategy initiatives in the new year.

The Juvenile Court welcomes the Honorable Alison L. Floyd, who joined the bench upon her election in November 2000. Her interest and dedication to juvenile justice will serve the Court well in the years ahead.

Along with these achievements, I hereby submit, in compliance with Ohio Revised code Section 2151.18, the 2000 Annual Report of the Cuyahoga County Juvenile Court concerning the number and kinds of cases before it, their dispositions, and other data pertaining to the work of the Court.



STATISTICS

After nearly two years of intense program development, the Court's new Juvenile Information Management System (JIMS) was implemented in July 2000. It replaced the old JCIS system, and is a case management system geared toward a more efficient case hearing process, providing at the same time a much needed accountability of the Court's workflow. Unlike the old system operated through the County's Information Services, JIMS is an in-house system with unprecedented program flexibility. Proware of Cincinnati, Ohio was the purveyor of the service that was implemented with staff assistance and input. Technical support is provided through Administrative Services, while a separate staff is responsible for statistical reporting as well as for research and evaluative functions, reporting directly to the Court Administrator. Refinements were, and continue to be, made to the system as contingencies arise. Its implementation involved massive staff training.

Of immediate benefit is an ease of data entry and access in the area of case processing and case tracking. Other long-range benefits concern the expansion of data reporting, not only for internal purposes, but also for external use, for example, as in this Annual Report and in the Court's mandatory report to the Supreme Court of the State of Ohio. Expanded data, ease of access, and correlation possibilities allow for greater research and evaluative efforts, some of which are currently undertaken in the area of recidivism from both public and private placement facilities.

Also because of JIMS, we are able to report for the first time in many years, data on cases other than delinquency and unruly to which most reporting efforts were geared under JCIS. Previously, data on other types of cases were indiscriminately recorded, without refinement as to specific case types, i.e. neglect, abuse or dependency. Now we are able to extract more refined data, and the results are presented in this Annual Report, particularly in relation to specific charges and dispositions of those other types of cases.

Further, for the first time, we are able to account for the number of charges contained within a case file. Traditionally, delinquency has always been reported on a case basis despite the occurrence of multiple charges within the body of one case file. In other words, the extent of reported delinquent acts has tended to be under-reported. We also now have a reliable account of the number of individual offenders referred to the Court regarding the number of cases and the number of charges associated with them. Additional refinement of this data will allow for the determination of prior-known offenders, not only by the number of cases and offenses of the past, but also by their representation in the current year's caseload. It is expected that this data will allow for future planning of improved rehabilitative service delivery geared to a high at-risk population.

Among the data provided by JIMS for this Annual Report, it is the determination that the 13,834 delinquency and unruly cases referred to the Court in the year 2000 involved 19,726 offenses, and concerned 9,526 individual offenders. By comparison, the 13,834 cases of 2000 would relate to the 14,158 cases referred in 1999, only 324 fewer cases than in that year. While the volume of offenses is unknown for 1999, the manifestation, and the handling of 19,726 offenses in 2000 reflects more accurately the extent of juvenile deviance than does the case count measurement. Further, the offense count more accurately reflects the workload of the Court than would be suggested by use of case count as a "work unit" which has long-belied the actual volume of the Court's docket.

The geographical distribution of the delinquency and unruly population was 5,470 individuals, or 61% from the city of Cleveland, and 3,562 individuals, or 39% from other areas of the county (456 youths were from out of the county, and 38 were unidentified by residence). While a charge or offense count allows us to measure the extent of deviant behavior, the individual count here relates more to the population of each planning area. With this data related to census data for the year 2000, rates of delinquency may be established using the actual delinquent population (rather than by cases as in prior years.) The single highest area of individual delinquents was the Glenville Statistical Planning Area with 412 of the City of Cleveland's delinquent population. Other city areas of high frequency were Central, 279; Payne-Kirtland, 274; Clark-Fulton, 272; Hough, 246; Mt. Pleasant, 231; St. Clair-Superior, 227, and Detroit-Shoreway, 226 individuals. There were 2,167 individual offenders from all of the preceding city areas who accounted for approximately 40% of all Cleveland delinquents. Cleveland Heights and East Cleveland, with 321 and 322 individuals respectively, were the highest of the suburbs, followed by Lakewood and Parma, each with 308 juveniles. These four areas accounted for 1,259 individual offenders, or 35% of the suburban delinquent population. All the preceding areas of the city and suburbs accounted for 3,425 individual offenders, and represented 38% of the county's delinquent population.

There were 4,334 offenses against the person, including 1,998 assault charges, 957 domestic violence charges, 516 menacing charges, 411 robbery charges, 276 sex charges and 5 homicides (down from 25 in 1998, and 10 in 1999.) There were 5,750 property offenses, including 2,339 theft charges, 986 receiving stolen property charges, 791 burglary charges and 752 vandalism charges. There were 2,119 drug offenses filed, the most frequent charge was possession, with 1,813 reported. Other most frequent delinquency charges included 845 weapon charges, 572 disorderly conduct charges and 501 liquor violations. Unruly charges amounted to 4,089, with the most frequent charge being incorrigibility at 2,694.

Cases of abuse, dependency and neglect increased by 8% in 2000 compared to 1999; 4,463 cases compared to 4,823 cases. There were 3,836 Parent-Child Relationship Cases seeking paternity and support determinations filed in 2000. Other cases filed during that year included 12,874 juvenile traffic violations.

The Court made 2,600 new probation orders during the year concerning the supervision of youth before it. Including those youth so ordered during the year, the Probation Department supervised approximately 5,000 offenders altogether with those carried over from the previous year. Of those youths, 352, or 14.3% were unsuccessful and were committed to correctional facilities. Total commitments to correctional facilities, including those not on probation at the time of commitment, amounted to 822 during the year. Bindovers for trial as adults in the Criminal Division of the Common Pleas Court increased somewhat over 1999, from 74 to 85 in 2000. During the year, there were 565 permanent or temporary custody orders made to the County Division of Children and Family Services regarding abused, dependent and neglected children. In addition, 290 protective supervision orders were issued to the division, and 1,944 protective supervision orders were terminated during the year. Please refer to the Statistical Tables and Charts located elsewhere in this report for more detailed data on the cases before the Court for the year 2000.

CHART I - INTAKE ACTIVITY BY CASE TYPE




